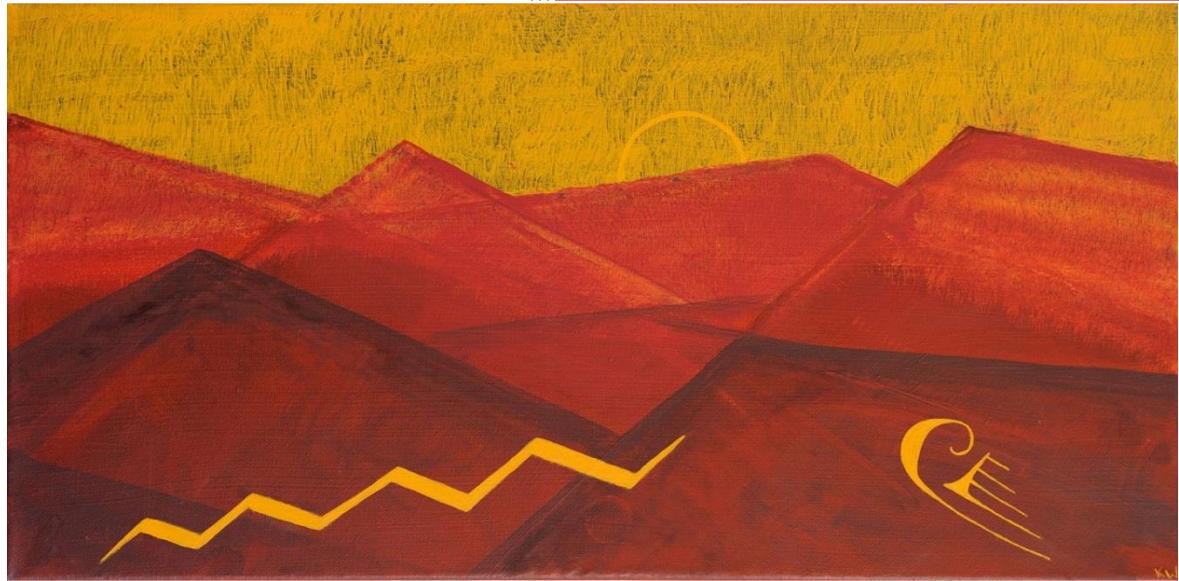

However, program participants do not have to reside in a nursing home. Many ALTCS participants live in their own homes or an assisted living facility and receive needed in-home services.

Eligibility Information: Clients must be determined in need of a nursing home level of care as determined by AHCCCS; Be a citizen or qualified immigrant; Have a Social Security Number (SSN) or apply for one; Be an Arizona resident; Apply for all cash benefits that you may be entitled to, such as Pensions or VA benefits; Live in an approved living arrangement, such as own home, or an AHCCCS certified nursing facility or assisted living facility. Clients must call their local ALTCS office to request an application; another person can act on the client's behalf during the application process.

The Program strives to provide continuity of care providing available and affordable child care services and increase the number of children to advance their cultural and developmental skills and to promote children's physical, emotional, intellectual and social growth in a safe and healthy learning environment and to increase parent involvement.

Overview: The Hopi Foundation is a 501(c) (3) non-profit organization located on the Hopi reservation and serves the Hopi community across 12 villages in Northeastern Arizona and through a project in Tucson, AZ. Established by local people, the Foundation acts as a catalyst, a resource generator and a convener that helps the local community work collectively for the betterment of the whole.

Traditionally for the Hopi, everything was always done together. The Hopi plant, cultivate, harvest and preserve their food together in an isolated environment that requires collaboration on all levels in order to survive physically and culturally. The Hopi Foundation uses this philosophy in the Hopi context of *philanthropy* and the work of the Hopi Foundation is embodied in the principles of *Sumi'nangwa*, meaning to come together to do activities for the benefit of all, and *Hita'nangwa* as taking the initiative to support the community without having to be acknowledged for those efforts.

The Foundation's Hopi name, *Lomasumi'nangwtukwsiwmani*, means the coming together of all life spirits, in unison and positive thought to create projects where by all life can benefit. Like a plant it embodies the continuous process of seeding, nurturing, growing and maturing. The name has proved to be a blessing for daily it is our guide to how we work with each other and how we conduct business.

Overview: The Hopi Guidance Center offers individual, family and group counseling services that address mental health and substance abuse needs; case management; telepsychiatry services, prevention and education services; crisis services; services to meet court-orders to treatment; and limited transportation services. The Center also coordinates placement in inpatient substance abuse rehabilitation centers and psychiatric hospitals.

The Center currently offers a voluntary 16-week intensive outpatient Matrix program for adults and adolescents that consist of Early Recovery, Family Education, Relapse Prevention, Social Support Group, and individual and family sessions. The Alcohol-Drug Education classes are held weekly (10-week class).
